

Some Thoughts For Opening Day

I am supposed to be writing an article in preparation for the coming season. This issue of Mainstream will cover March and April. Which means that by the time the next Mainstream arrives opening day will have come and gone. Opening day always marks the beginning of an angler's year, even for those of us who fish all year long it is a symbol of the new season.

This year on the political front we have a new administration in Trenton. We have a new governor, new DEP commissioner and new head of Fish and Wildlife. The new Governor has done little this year to distinguish himself to sportsmen so far. The new DEP chief shows promise, but so far has not had to face any issue of consequence. The current acting DEP director is Dave Chanda, who has a long history with the Division of Fish and Wildlife. Hopefully by the time this newsletter is out of date he will have been made full fledged director.

With luck none of us will have to have our lives impacted one way or the other by these changes. We are normally more concerned with what's hatching and where the fish are biting. (Both valid and critical data to keep track of.) But the water we fish in and the woods we hunt are under the control of all these people. It behooves us all to make sure they know this and that our voices are heard on issues like clean water and preservation of our cold water resources.

There are a couple of immediate items that may affect you this season. A Point of Sale (POS) license system is slated to be online before opening day, (April 8th). This system will allow F&G to track license sales in a much more effective and business smart way. There are always fears when data is gathered about us by "the government". I'm as skeptical of the folks in the statehouse as the next guy. But Fish and Wildlife have always treated sportsmen and women as a valued client. They have promised not to sell or share their database with anyone, a vow I believe. They will however, use the data to find out who has stopped buying a license, who is buying one for the first time. Mining this kind of data is critical to helping stem the decline of fishing and hunting license sales.

There are a couple of other pending changes. First and foremost due to F&W not stocking a few lakes with low holdover, they will stock almost 20% more trout into the major rivers for opening day. This should increase angler success and get folks excited about opening day. Overall the same number of fish will be raised for stocking. Average size will be unchanged for opening day, but there will be more trout available in places folks are likely to catch them.

Word from the fisheries forum in January and the stocking meeting in February is that several thousand landlocked salmon fry have been acquired from New England. These will be stocked into an undisclosed place sometime before opening day. The state is keeping the exact location quiet until just before (or perhaps just after) the stocking. The secrecy is partly because they are still studying the likely waterways and partly to drum up a little press excitement for the announcement. There are several likely candidates, but at deadline time your guess is as good as mine.

Over the past few years I normally spend my opening day schmoozing politicians and awarding prizes to the state's essay winners in the morning. Then my son and I sneak out and try and catch the Hendrickson hatch on the South Branch of the Raritan in the afternoon. It's always fun, and sometimes we actually catch a few.

I wish you all a safe and happy opening day. Remember to enjoy the day, and remember that the sport we love depends on cold clean water. Our mission at TU is to fight to make sure that our children and grandchildren can experience opening day in the future, and that means fighting to protect the water for them.


MEETINGS AND DIRECTIONS
