Move Over Fellas

Drought conditions throughout the northeast discouraged many anglers from fishing this summer but the CJTU trip program still triumphed. The only productive tail waters to fish were in Connecticut on the Farmington and Housatonic rivers. No one minded the sudden change of plans as long as we guaranteed better fishing. New participants included Judy and Brian Buontempo, Bonnie Donohue, Peggy Salisbury, and Rich Post, along with the usuals like Hal Fish, Larry Gove, Brian Rockerfeller, John Wester, Dave Hart, and myself.

The water levels were low and so were the water temps, making the conditions comfortable for the fish to feed. The evening temps were much cooler than here at home. Even with the daytime air temps in the 80's, if you didn't have fleece pants or at the very least heavy socks, you'd be shivering in no time.

Fishing these Connecticut rivers are always well worth the trip. The motel rooms are clean and affordable. the food is good and reasonably priced, and the fishing though tough at times, is outstanding. For the purists, there are tremendous hatches of Olives, Caddis, Sulphurs, Isonychias and Golden Stoneflies. The rivers are well stocked with plenty of large browns, rainbows, and brookies. There are large numbers of holdover and wild trout as well. For the radicals, there are smallies, sunnies, and landlocked salmon. And since, there is so much water to fish, we always find the time to explore new places-on and off the water.

One memorable morning on the Farmington, Hal and I had the pleasure of instructing Brian Buontempo. The three of us were in a run no longer than six car lengths and no wider than two. We were on the water at 6:30 AM. Fish were surfacing everywhere. They were larger than average size and there could easily have been over a hundred trout and salmon in this run.

For those of you who haven't met Brian, he's a bright young angler with a lot of natural instinct and talent. Though he's only been fly fishing for a couple of summers, he can cast better most of us. Do you remember your first visit to Cabelas? Did you feel like me... overwhelmed? You didn't know where to start, but wanted to see everything? Picture Brian--this is his first fishing trip. He's a little green and not too familiar with his fly box. Fish are feeding everywhere, some even jumping clear out of the water. To add to the mayhem, these fish are huge. He was surely overwhelmed and didn't quite know where to start. His youthful impatience made up for his naivete as he was ready to start casting without tying on a fly.

I tied on a Trico to 7x tippet, and gave Brian an elk hair caddis and 6x tippet. Bang, fish on! I wrestled with that fish for at least five minutes before he eventually broke me off. He was big. Brian yells, "Hey, got anymore of those tricos?" "Maybe...first fish with what you've got on for a while longer" I replied. I tied on an elk hair caddis next. Bang, fish on! This one I wasn't losing. We wrestled for fifteen minutes before I finally netted a fat twenty inch brown." Hey, what'd you catch him on?" he shouts. "Same thing you have on" I answered. "Then why aren't I catch'in um? Can I come and fish near you? They aren't over here "he moans. "Stav where you are." I said, "You don't deserve fish like these, yet". Hal added, "You haven't earned the right to catch them. You're still too young to catch fish like these". Of course we were kidding him. Sounding like a Zen master, I said, "Concentrate on one fish at one time. Stop casting to every rising fish. You'll catch one.". (Can anyone relate?) We fished that run until 5:30 in the afternoon. And yes, Brian eventually caught the fish he had hoped to.

Other cherishing moments of one of our trips involved John Wester. Seems he remembered to pack plenty of flies, rods, reels, his fishing vest, and wading boots, but failed to pack chest waders or any other piece of clothing to wear that weekend. Luckily, Bonnie, Peggy, and he wore the same sizes. What he can do with so little...I have photos...enough said.

Speaking of the gals, I must say, they added more to the trips than we ever expected. First of all they smelled better than the rest of us. In fact, WE smelled better than we normally do. Secondly, we all ate with utensils and used napkins more during the meals rather than with our fingers and shirt sleeves. But, the biggest hurdle was in getting us to use cups during "Happy Hour" instead of us all swigging from the same jug. And, once again Peggy amazed us all with the number of three inch trout that she caught. It was tiring to watch her flick them off her fly. Jealous would be more to the point. She out fished most of us and that we weren't prepared for.

All kidding aside, it was great having Brian and the gals join us this summer. I hope to see more of them on future adventures. On behalf of the trip committee I'd like to thank all those who participated this year. It takes a lot of planning, research, and preparation for Hal and me to pull off each and every trip.
